




Science Lab News

- What's Happening in Our Science Lab?
- The Science Fair was a great success and now the Science Lab is humming with experiments at each grade level.
- Our Kindergarten is learning about the Sun and Moon. We've read several good books, watched some entertaining videos, and have drawn pictures to understand that the Sun appears during the day and the Moon appears during the night and only sometimes during the day. We've also talked about planets in our solar system and how these planets relate to each other.
- The first grade was amazed at how gravity affects objects the same regardless of their size and composition. We also spent quite a bit of time on force and motion. Using a marble track to show up, down, zig zag, straight, forward, and backward was great fun! Another great activity was trying to design a boat out of aluminum foil that could float the most pennies.









 The second grade is starting their unit on Earth's materials. We examined igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic rocks as well as read about the rock cycle. Prior to this, we learned about our skeletal system and some of our body's organs.
 We are very lucky to have a skeleton model that is actual size and a smaller sized model to show all the organs in our abdomen and chest.

The third grade has spent the last few weeks working with our microscopes to examine different types and parts of plants. We are very lucky to have enough microscopes that each student can use their own while in the science lab. Our third grade also spent some time learning about different animal habitats and how plants and animals are classified.

- The fourth grade has spent the last few weeks finishing up on their Science Fair presentations and learning about animal and plants. Owl pellets are the regurgitation of fur and bones that owls cannot digest. It helps us to understand habitats and food chains/webs.
- The fifth grade has also spent the last few weeks finishing up on their Science Fair presentations. We then moved on to matter and its properties. We've reviewed how to use a pan balance and graduated cylinder correctly and how to calculate density.

Our students our doing a great job with the activities that are reinforcing what they learn in their regular classroom. Keep up the good work, Geckos!








From the Nurse

A few reminders for your health as we start the new year. We stressed handwashing during Decembers' annual Handwashing Awareness week and hope that all continue to "Spread the Word, NOT the Germs". Sanitizers are good when soap and water is not available, but good old soap and water is best to wash those hands to get germs off. Also, try not to touch the "T zone":eyes, nose and mouth, as this is where those pesky germs like to enter our bodies at.

We also want to remind you that during the colder months, when we tend to wear hats and hoodies, the dreaded head louse uses these items as a means of transportation. Lice **DO NOT** jump or fly but are very fast crawlers. We stress children not share jackets, hats, hair ties, hair brushes/combs, etc. Without a "host", they die within 24-48 hours and are temperature sensitive.

Did you know that there is a ½ hour rule of picking up your student? You cannot pick up your student after 2:30, as the students are getting ready for release. If you are calling to make a change in your students transportation, it must be by 2:30. Please do not wait until dismissal and call in.

If you are coming into the school during school hours, please do not park in the drop off lanes. You will be parking in the Fire Safety Zone. If there were to be a fire incident at the school the Fire trucks would not be able to park. Please park in the parking lot. Thank you for your support.
